MARRIAGE & FAMILY CONFERENCES UGANDA

On Sunday, I had the privilege of preaching on "*Love One Another*" at Bishop Kamanzi's church. The worship was truly inspiring, and the congregation was attentive to the message. Afterward, we were warmly welcomed by Bishop John and Pauline at their home for a delightful lunch.

On Monday, we visited the Uganda Martyrs Museum Namugongo, a poignant reminder of the sacrifice of 45 Anglican and Catholic martyrs. The annual pilgrimage on June 3rd draws over 800,000 people.



Tuesday and Wednesday, we led a conference in Kampala with over 200 attendees. I shared messages on various topics, while Bishop John provided insights on marriage. Laurie and Pauline Kamanzi addressed over 100 women, and I spoke to over 30 men about the importance of fatherhood.

It was both surprising and concerning to learn that many fathers in this culture don't play with their children and that married couples often avoid public displays of affection. I demonstrated simple acts of affection, like holding hands while walking, encouraging the participants to incorporate these practices into their own relationships.

I also challenged the fathers to prioritize spending quality time with their children. Reminding them that who ever spends time with them influences them. On Thursday, we ventured into the stunning countryside, where we were captivated by the breathtaking beauty of coffee bean, banana, and tea plantations.

We held a conference at a small church, creating a space for heartfelt conversations. During this time, I received numerous questions about marriage, including the deeply troubling issue of domestic violence. I passionately challenged this harmful practice, emphasizing the biblical imperative for husbands to love their wives sacrificially, lovingly, and protectively. The church leaders were moved by this message and expressed a strong commitment to addressing this issue and taking a leadership role in promoting healthy marriages.

On Friday and Saturday, we concluded our confer-



ences at a larger church surrounded by a serene landscape of palm trees and lush fields. Despite a delay caused by thunderstorms, the attendees' enthusiasm was unwavering. The message on loving one's wife as Christ loves the church resonated deeply with the audience, and the men were particularly

engaged during the fatherhood discussion. We fielded a multitude of questions, witnessing a genuine desire for guidance and support.



The church was incredibly enthusiastic about learning how to build a Christ-centered marriage.

They were particularly touched by the simple act of Laurie and me walking hand-in-hand, which served as a visual reminder of the love and intimacy that should characterize a godly marriage. We ended the weekend at Pastor Richard's church outside of Kampala.

It was heartwarming to be surrounded by such a joyful congregation.
